

Envisioning Growth in Africa - By Dr. Edward Agbai

The Africa Development Bank has been at the forefront of championing developmental initiatives for the African continent. The organization does this in active collaboration with the African Union and the subregional bodies like the ECO-WAS. The AGENDA 2063 set out by the AU outlines broad measures towards African development. It is a blueprint

for transforming Africa into a global powerhouse of the future. "It is the continent's strategic framework that aims to deliver on its goal for inclusive and sustainable development and is a concrete manifestation of the pan-African drive for unity, self -determination, freedom, progress and collective prosperity pursued under Pan-Africanism and African Renaissance" retrieved from: <u>https://au.int/en/</u> <u>agenda2063/overview</u>

Having set out such lofty ideals in a vision document, who drives the process? To what extent does Africa's future depend on the US, the EU, and China? What role does global governance play in encouraging development outcomes? Stakeholders within the continent need to answer these questions because we are witnesses to the struggles of South African against apartheid and the attainment of political independence by countries in the last century. In the last two decades, the continent has seen civil unrest, internal wars, displaced people, an increase in armed banditry, and terrorism. Suffice it to say that Africa is facing a myriad of issues including hunger and starvation

ment amid the daunting task of curbing crime and criminality? Who will champion the continental and regional integration? Expand the democratic governance space and reposition Africa to becoming a dominant player in the global arena?

The average age of the continent's 10 oldest leaders is about 75 years old compared to about 50 years old for the ten most developed economies. With very few young leaders under 50 years old within the continent. Paradoxically, the continent has the youngest population in the world. How can the aged leadership drive an agenda (AGENDA 2063) that they will not be part of? Are the young people part of the active stakeholders for the agenda? Whose responsibility is it to make this critical mass of young people on the agenda that will drive their future?

Developed countries like Germany and United States have integrated young professionals in working groups to drive developmental processes as active stakeholders. President Joe Biden of the United States in constituting his cabinet was conscious of the diversity and

demography of the United State, thus making his cabinet diverse and young.

Conscious efforts must be made to bring young people into governance in Africa. Rwanda has been a shining light in this regard and this has accounted for the innovative minds running that country. The President of Rwanda, Paul Kagame has been critical of his compatriots around the continent on the need for a paradigm shift in the governance process.

As we struggle through our collective insight to become relevant in an ever-changing and dynamic world, we must use our combined and collective will to endear a future continental development in governance and empowerment initiatives for young people. My one cent on possible

My one cent on possible solutions facing the continent is to develop a framework of flexible continental development governance. A framework that warehouses all the developmental initiatives of the regional and sub-regional bodies. A framework that integrates private investors as active stakeholders through advocacy regional political stability as a panacea for development to thrive. Such a framework achieves the objec-

tive of a leaner governance structure with the linear target of African overall development. It integrates the works of philanthropic, NGOs, Civil Society Organizations into the development initiative of other subregional thereby refocusing the overarching goal of all organizations in Africa, which is African Integrated Development.
